Here's how to take this simple quiz: read the statements on the following pages and consider the degree to which each one describes you or your beliefs. After reading each statement, write the number that most closely reflects your response. Choose from 0 to 5, according to the following scale:

- 5 "That's totally me."
- 4 "That's usually like me."
- 3 "That's often like me."
- 2 "That's a little like me."
- 1 "That's barely like me."
- 0 "That's not me at all."

Don't spend a lot of time pondering the statements. Simply jot down your initial response, from 0 to 5, and move on to the next one. Repeat the process until you've written down responses to all 42 statements.
